The Truth About Working At A College Town Bar

Katelyn Megan, a senior at UMass, knows firsthand what it's like to be the sober person in a bar full of intoxicated people. As a bartender at LIT in Amherst, Massachusetts, she's working when most of the people her age are out drinking. One of the many bars in a college town, LIT currently employs 15 bartenders, all which are college students. Of the 15, 5 are guys and the rest are girls. Katelyn previously worked as a waitress and both her father and brother were bartenders, so she knew what to expect when she began working long hours and cleaning up after drunk college students. Katelyn shares with the Lala her pet peeves, if it's cool to drink on the job, and more.

On the long hours: As an athlete on the field hockey team at UMass, Katelyn says it's the only job whose hours fit into her schedule. But that cleaning up after closing is the absolute worst part of the shift. Katelyn says that clean up takes at least 2 hours and she usually doesn't get home until 3 in the morning. The girls are also required to wear heels which makes being on her feet for 6 hours much more painful. Katelyn still puts school first and her boss is understanding in giving her a night off if she has a game or a test the next day.

"My management is extremely caring about their employees. While they let us know that we're replaceable, they do everything they can to accommodate our needs and understand that we're just college students trying to make money and that we still want to have a good time."

When asked what the protocol was for drinking on the job, Katelyn prefers not to.

"If someone offers to buy me a drink, I normally say they shouldn't waste their money on me and suggest another person they can buy a drink for. But when my friends come into the bar and they want me to have a beer with them, I don't see a problem in this because I know my limits and understand that I'm at my job."







When friends come into the bar, Katelyn admits she gets a bit distracted because she would rather stay and talk to them, which diverts her attention away from other customers. But if anything, having her friends there only makes the night better.

"I believe that when my friends come and we're loud and happy with each other that it only adds to the good vibes that are supposed to be at a bar. Also, knowing people that come into the bar makes me look good in front of my boss. Every bar owners wants his bartenders to attract more customers."

Her view on the college drinking culture:





Now that Katelyn has been able to view the college drinking culture from a different perspective, she says, "I believe the house and frat parties that people go to before they're old enough for the bars say a lot more about the college drinking culture than the bars do. People get crazier at those things. But seeing how often certain people go to my bar makes me ask myself, "how are these broke college kids affording all of this alcohol?"

Flirting, free drinks, and being a female bartender:







"I actually find that girls are more likely to wait for the male bartenders to serve them so they can flirt whereas the guys at the bar will just go to whoever can get them a drink faster. A lot of my co-workers actually use their flirtation abilities to get more tips, which I appreciate because we pool our tips. There is the occasional stud who thinks he'll score a free beer flirting with one of the female bartenders, but they quickly learn that this will never happen. I personally don't take flirting very well. Alcohol makes people do and say stupid stuff, and to me that's not worthy of a smile."

Her pet peeves:

"I find it annoying when people ask for free drinks or they say the drink doesn't taste like there's alcohol in it. The BuzzFeed video called "Things Bartenders Want You to Stop Doing" actually sums it up pretty nicely."

If people do ask her to make the drink stronger, she obliges, but over the years she's learned tricks of the trade. She's learned to put a little alcohol on the straw so the first few sips taste strong.

Her worst night:







From underage kids sneaking in to guys starting fights with each other (which happens on a weekly basis), Katelyn has experienced her fair share of drama. She recalls one night when underage students managed to sneak in to the bar, even though fake IDs are not easily accepted at LIT. That same night, the ABC (Alcoholic Beverage Control) happened to be checking the bar for underage drinking and questioned the students, as well as Katelyn because she was found serving them.

"The cop gave me a speech about how it would be my fault if they died. But we have bodyguards at the door so I assume everyone inside is 21," adds Katelyn.

Best part of the job:

Another pro to the gig is the social aspect. Katelyn likes being in an outgoing environment that involves dancing and music, where she gets to experience the nightlife but makes money, instead of spending it. Plus, being the sober one in a drunk atmosphere means she sees everything.

"You will never believe the things you see as a bartender."

Overall, being a bartender has been a good experience for Katelyn.
